Dear Parents

It was great to celebrate Samoan Language week recently. As you will see in the newsletter, there were many activities undertaken by our classes that encouraged learning of the Samoan language and culture. On the Friday, we celebrated with a colourful shirt day. It was great to see everyone turn up so brightly - including some parents!



We were also privileged to have Mr Tafu come to our assembly and talk about Samoa and teach us language through song. Next term we will be studying the Pacific and so we will be learning much more about Pacific culture.

At the end of this term, we will hold another parent meeting for our Pasifika parents to build on our meeting from last year and to support our students ongoing learning. We will be in touch shortly to inform you of details for this fono.

In Week 10 of this term, we will be holding our mid-year Parent and Teacher Interviews. We have allocated 15 minutes per interview to allow us to go into more detail about the progress your child is making. We will also present you with various pieces of information to take away with you regarding their learning to date, and next steps for the rest of the year. As we will not be writing a formal report, it is important that you make an appointment with your teacher to ensure you get all the important information on your child's progress.

Senior students from Year 4 up are asked to attend the interview with their parents. For the younger ones there will be supervision available in the gym lounge. Remember that we finish earlier at 12.40pm-1pm. Please make arrangements to collect your child at that time.

We have just passed the longest night of the year! More sunlight is on the way, if not warm weather for a while yet. I am reminded of the scripture in Psalm 30:5 that says, 'Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning' – it is one of my favourite scriptures, as it lends to us the fact that there is hope and light at the end of what seems to be ongoing hardship and difficulty. 


Room Four
